OLD GUYS CAN CHANGE!

I believe in the power of reading because I've witnessed it first hand.

Let me tell you about a (sadly passed away) good friend called Rusty.

Rusty was that difficult Dutch Reformed naysayer when I reached Reedley, CA. I was warned that Rusty would be against every-



thing. History seemed to agree. At most church meetings the loudest disagreeing voice was normally Rusty's. But, a year before I got there things were beginning to change in Rusty.

The reason – guided by God's Spirit – included a book Rusty had read. It was called **An Unstoppable Force: Daring to Become the Church God Had in Mind @ Erwin Raphael McManus**. (Published 2001 and now newly reprinted.) I'm unsure how this book got into Rusty's hands but it stirred him.

When I arrived Rusty's appetite for more reading had been wetted. His thirst for learning was amazing. But his honesty was the most inspiring. Rusty explained that for years, many years, Pastors had made church about being a club, exclusive to its members. That allowed the grumpiest member to get things his way. But his eyes and mind were now being opened to church being for its non-members and he wanted to know more. His honesty however caused him to ask the question—could he, at his retired stage in life, get it and be a part of the new? That led Rusty to ask me for more books to read to 'get it'. Books that would open his thinking to the more, the better, the new of what Church and The Faith were really about.

So this month I want to list 10 of the books Rusty read. I do so hoping that if you have a 'Rusty' in your church you might share this story and encourage him or her to also read these books.

1) An Unstoppable Force: Daring to Become the Church God Had in Mind @ Erwin Raphael McManus

This was the one that got something started in Rusty.

2) The Apostolic Congregation: Church Growth Reconceived for a New Generation @ George Hunter III

Early on I gave Rusty this book. I had met George Hunter while at Northern Seminary and his grasp of cultural changes and what the church needs to do to engage with it impressed me. The book is dated now (2009) but has much insight.

3) <u>Letters from a Skeptic: A Son Wrestles with His Father's Questions about Christianity</u> @ Gregory Boyd & Edward Boyd

What needed to be challenged was Rusty's classic, closed off Christian theology. It wasn't something he had really read into. He had just accepted what he had been taught by Pastors for six generations. This book helped Rusty see that questioning was a good thing.

4) Velvet Elvis: Repainting the Christian Faith @ Rob Bell

This one did Rusty in - in a good way! It continued his reframing of the narrative. It allowed him to see something bigger than formulas and propositions. He loved this book and the old Nooma videos Bell used to produce.

5) Missional Church: A Vision for the Sending of the Church in N. America @ Darrell Guder

Of a deeper theology, Rusty was eager to think deep about the church and its purpose. This book, though 201/301 in its theology, was thoroughly underlined and highlighted as Rusty devoured the missional theology of the church.

6) <u>The Purpose Driven Church: Growth Without Compromising Your Message and Mission</u> @ *Rick Warren*

Anyone remember this one? Seemed strange to read Rob Bell, McManus and Warren together – and enjoy them equally. But this one really helped Rusty see the church differently.

7) The Barbarian Way: Unleash the Untamed Faith Within @ Erwin Raphael McManus

McManus had started it all for Rusty – this book spoke into his own life and his role as an older leader. I think his comments after reading it were "I wish I'd read this 30 years ago!"

8) Searching for God Knows What @ Donald Miller

This again helped Rusty see The Faith differently. So much of what was happening to Rusty, and others, was a rethinking of The Faith. It brought him alive. The change they needed to get wasn't just about how the church should reach younger people; it was the change of what it was we actually believed and how it should be lived.

9) Leading Change @ John P. Kotter

The essential read that helped Rusty and my Board see the steps we needed to take to enable change to take hold.

10) Death by Meeting @ Patrick Lencioni

This is when Rusty threw out Robert's Rules! When he read Lencioni's book on effective meetings (and boy did Rusty have a love/hate relationship with meetings), out went Robert's Rules and in came effective, pragmatic, fluid meeting protocol. And this wet his appetite to read more of Lencioni and learn so much about teams, leadership and organizational theory.

The story of an inward focused, classic Baptist church in the small city of Reedley, CA is the story of Rusty, and others like Rusty – old guys – getting it and changing. Their change was no small thing. But as a result of their change over 700 people came to know Christ and be baptized. Their change helped birth a new type of church drawing people of all ages and ethnicities to come and meet Christ, and of seeing a big Kingdom vision being outworked.

Perhaps it's time to put new books into the hands of your older folks.

Maybe it's time to put new books at your welcome center, new books for your Sunday School to read, new books for your Board to read.

It's a leadership question I kept asking my leaders, my critics, my colleagues – "What are you reading these days?" followed by "can I suggest you read this book."

Still reading. Still rethinking.
